My interest in the topic of nomadism $\ensuremath{\mathsf{I}}$ began during the migration from my home country with the start of the Russian military invasion of Ukraine. Reflecting on the issues of nationalism, the power of the state, cultural identity, as well as the question of a foreigner and hospitality, I propose to turn to a selection of these books that could help find answers to questions about what place and space are, how much mobility helps in gaining freedom, and is each of us really a nomad already, according to the daily use of the Internet space?

Anastasiia Sviridenko is an artist from Ukraine currently based in Finland. She graduated in fine arts from the Moscow state academic art institute and works in various media, including painting, graphics, and sculpture. Her practice is based on working with relationships and connections between human emotions, information flows and the vitalistic pulsation of material things. In her work, Sviridenko resorts to the aesthetics of horror as a tool for working out collective fears of the incomprehensible.
